BACK TO SCHOOL HUNT



It's hard to think about kids starting back to school in August. Ms. Erickson welcomed the 32 club members (students) who came out to the playground (Majestic View Park) on a very warm and humid August day. A special thank you to Laura L. for bringing the teacher an apple. Laura got a yellow star and she wore it proudly during the hunt. Unfortunately the custodian didn't get our weeds in playground cut down and they were higher than any of us would have liked. However, that wasn't going to



keep us indoors. The playground was seeded with approximately 850 coins, including 200 silver dimes, dollar coins, half dollars and quarters. The hunt field also contained some miscellaneous rings, jewelry, school supplies, toys and a number of keys. Two of those keys opened a school locker that was placed in the middle of the hunt field. The first person to find a key that opened the lock got the

first choice of two pencil bags in the locker, and their locker partner (the student who found the second key) got the second pencil bag. Each of these pencil bags contained a silver round, a \$2 bill, a slabbed penny, slabbed nickel, large cent, silver half, silver quarter, silver dime, Indian head cent and wheat cent. Yes, Mr. Erickson, some of those were donations from our collection at home. Thank you. The other eight numbered keys were also good for prizes at the end of the hunt. Some of the



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clad coins on the playground were attached to a scrabble letter for the overachievers who wanted to participate in the “test” after the hunt.

After the teacher (Ms. Erickson) welcomed the students, and the principal (Mr. Erickson) set the rules, the students took their place around the perimeter of the playground. A whistle started the hunt and the students began picking their way

through the weeds in search of treasures. We were about 5 minutes into the hunt when the first student (Glen) tried unsuccessfully to open the locker. About 10 minutes later Pat Lucero came to try his key and successfully opened the locker



for the first pencil bag. A number of others came forward to try their keys in the locker, but it wasn't until Everett Johnston came to the locker with a working key that the second pencil bag was claimed. Because of the heat, we cut our playground time a bit short but allowed students to go back out after lunch.



Students who found the other numbered keys were given prizes of silver half dollars, copper rounds (donated by Boots L., and a ½ oz. silver round donated by Bruce M.) Lined writing paper was passed out to those who wanted to take the

math or spelling test, and instructions were given for no cheating or sharing of tiles. The math portion of the test required the students to add up the value of all their scrabble tiles. Mark claimed a silver half dollar with a high score of 44 points. To complete their spelling test, the students were asked to spell the single, highest point word with their scrabble letters. Jeff L. won a silver half for spelling “unluckily.” I'd say that was lucky!



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There were three other special prizes awarded for items in the hunt field. One of those items was a quarter with a clown on it. Joyce K. (our class clown) won a silver round. Jeff L. turned out to be the “teacher’s pet” by finding the cat, and Boots L. won a dos peso for finding the gold star.



Our wonderful lunch ladies (Nancy F. and Jane R.) adorned with hair nets, gloves and aprons served up a lunch fit for any student. Hot dogs were grilled by Ron E., and others brought some clever school lunch sides, including fruit salad, alphabet lettered cookies, those memorable hostess cupcakes, school bus candy bars, and many other delicious items. Thank you to all those who brought sides to share.

It is almost time to determine a new **Coinhuna**. In our annual Club competition hunt, one individual rises above the rest and is crowned our best hunter, the best of the best for the year! The winner receives a gold Dos Pesos, a fishing vest embroidered with his/her name, and his/her name added to the prestigious Coinhuna Plaque.



Coinhuna is our “give back to the Club” hunt for all the support our members have given the Club over the year. There is no Hunt Fee. This is our way of saying thanks to our membership. This year’s Coinhuna Hunt will be held at the Robby Ferrufino Park in Arvada on September 15. The Club will supply Subway Sandwiches, Chips and Drinks. Bring a side dish or desert, and we will eat like kings.

The Coinhuna Hunt is a members-only hunt.

Hunters must have headphones and an empty pouch (checked by the Huntmaster prior to each hunt).

For the first 3 Fields, each hunter must find 10 coins, in any combination, to advance to the next field. Field 4 will require 20 coins to win the coveted title of Coinhuna for 2019-20.

Hunt Field 1. Hunters must find 10 coins to advance. The first 24 Hunters will advance.

Hunt Field 2. Hunters must find 10 coins to advance. The first 12 Hunters will advance.

Hunt Field 3. Hunters must find 10 coins to advance. The first 3 Hunters will advance.

Hunt Field 4. The first Hunter to find 20 coins will be the new Great Coinhuna for 2019-20.

When a hunter finds his/her required number of coins, he/she **MUST RAISE** his/her COIL and promptly proceed to a Counting Field Judge to have the coins counted and verified. The Field Judges will be located in the center of the field. Successful hunters with their quota of coins will form a single line in front of the Field Judges and have their coins checked. The hunters who have the correct number of coins will receive a Pass Cup and then go to the Recording Field Judge, who will take the hunter’s name. Then, the successful hunter **MUST EXIT** the field.

When the number of hunters allowed to advance to the next field is reached, the Huntmaster will blow a signal horn. When the horn sounds, all hunters **MUST STOP HUNTING** or **RECOVERING IMMEDIATELY** and **RAISE THEIR COILS** and **EXIT** the field. No hunter will be allowed in that hunt field until the entire Coinhuna contest is over.

Unwanted coins and trash may not be left on the field. Throwing items back is grounds for expulsion from the contest.

The competition will be a perimeter start. Digging tools will not be allowed. A small probe, (12” or

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less) is permissible, but be careful, as a number of nice coins are planted. There should not be any digging, but all perceived “dig holes” must be filled in immediately.

This is a friendly competition and proper courtesy and rules of etiquette apply.

After the new Coinhuna is crowned, hunters may re-enter the fields to “clean up” all those surplus coins.

Friday, August 2nd, 2019

In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (non-members may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times

during the hunt.

2. All hunters must wear headphones.
3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.





National Forrest Service Passport in Time by Chris Davis

August Meeting Presentation

At the August club meeting, Chris Davis made a Powerpoint presentation of the National Forest Service's Passport in Time (PIT) program. Members Randy Sable, Mary Sable, and Chris Davis took part in a recent PIT project near Capitan, New Mexico.

The Passport In Time (PIT) is a program the National Forest Service (NFS) uses to obtain slave labor for various projects it could not otherwise afford to conduct. The PIT website lists a wide array of historical and environmental projects across the nation, such as restorations, search for sites of archaeological and paleontological importance, and gives private citizens an opportunity to be involved. Folks volunteer for whatever projects they are interested in. Some projects, like this one, were centered around a metal detecting search.



This particular project was concerned with searching the location of a Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC) camp near Capitan, New Mexico. The camp was established in 1933 but was only in operation for a few years. Later the facility was used as an internment camp for the Japanese Americans during World War II. After that it was used to house young girls. An old Forest Service Ranger Station was located right across an adjacent dry creek. This facility was built somewhere around 1905. Last year a PIT search here found a number of military related items in this area including: a broken cavalry spur, an Indian-Wars uniform button and a pocket watch. During this year's hunt, among other things, searchers picked up a wide variety of interesting articles such as old bottles, a "US" Army collar insignia, several silver coins, 2 silver religious medallions, lots of old cartridges, a canteen cap stamped "U.S.F.S." (U.S. Forest Service), 2 rings, and 2 pocket watches. The oldest coin found was an 1898 Indian Head penny. The best find was a four-foot long Western Diamondback Rattlesnake.

Individuals interested in future PIT projects should monitor the National Forest Service website (www.passportintime.com/), or attend our metal detecting meetings where we will try to keep folks aware of upcoming projects.

Token: a piece resembling a coin issued by some person or entity, not of a governmental authority (with the exception of tax tokens), that could be redeemed for services or specified items. Advertisement tokens with no redeemable value are entered in the Artifact Category.

Artifact: simple object showing human workmanship or modification, and all other items that do not meet the criteria for other categories.






