

The "Ides of March" hunt held on March 15th saw 33 determined hunters alight at Robby Ferrufino Park in Arvada for a festive and frenetic search for coins, bling, tokens and other targets. Despite the ancient warning to "Beware" this infamous day, everyone watched their back and there was no foul play observed. There was no foul weather either - the temperature being a mild 46 degrees with sunshine finally breaking through.



The large hunt field was laid out and seeded with targets consisting of silver dimes and quarters, Indian Head pennies, Buffalo nickels, \$1, 50 cent, quarter and dime clad coins, plus Wheat pennies and



Eureka! Breakfast Club

Breakfast Club Report, March 6, 2020

After only a month of Breakfast Club cancellations, we finally managed to get one in before the next snowstorm. Sixteen hardy souls showed up for breakfast. Roy N. suggested we try Aurora City Park for our hunt. It turned out to be an excellent idea. However, Aurora City Park is one of those parks one needs to hunt in a group, early in the day. Temperature was great (mid 50's), as was soil moisture. It was a target rich environment. The lawn contained a carpet of pennies. You could not swing your coil without hitting one, or more. Just to make things a bit more challenging, there was also a carpet of bottle caps, aluminum bottle caps, pull tabs and those much sought after small aluminum liquor bottle caps.



We made some good finds. Three rings were recovered. The best was a very nice silver ring found by Bob H. The next best was a heavy gold plated "Morris Family" ring dug up by Brice Y. I picked up a truly ugly brass ring. But, as they say, a ring is a ring is a ring. Roy N. scooped up a nice copper necklace.



One of the most interesting finds was a turtle recovered by Jeff M. Alan B. got a Kennedy Half. Jim G. found a one-




dollar bill with his new XP Deus.



You really have to turn your sensitivity down low to get a good hit on paper bills.

I did best on change with a total of \$10.59. I also picked up a silver dime. Roy got \$6.75, but only because he had to leave early. Just for yucks and grins, I worked up



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the composition of my coin finds: 21 quarters, 36 dimes, 23 nickels, 59 pennies. In the process, I also recovered: a tube of glue, a broken beer bottle, 16 pulltabs, 18 bottle caps, 18 small liquor bottle caps, 7 aluminum bottle caps (King Cobra Malt Liquor was the drink of choice) and 9 other miscellaneous garbage items. I should point out, after my back gave out, I slowed down on recovering pennies and what were probably pulltabs, so, it




makes you wonder how many gold rings I skipped over. Such is detecting.



To Dig or Not to Dig (a Penny)

To dig or not to dig, that is the question. This is not a reference to Shakespeare, but to pennies, and whether it's worth the time and effort to dig them.



Let me start by saying I have nothing against pennies. I grew up without an abundance of material possessions, and sometimes I barely had "two pennies to rub together". I had to be sort of a "penny pincher" and quickly learned that "a penny saved is a penny earned". So with that background, I still value and respect the penny. (Also when I was young, I had a pet chicken named "Penny", but that's another story!)

Wise Ben Franklin said, "Watch the pennies and the dollars will take care of themselves." That's good advice. Some of my wise Eureka pals advise that if we don't dig every penny, we might overlook some jewelry that gives a signal like a penny, and we might also miss a rare Indian Head or

Wheat Ear penny. That may be true, but I nevertheless have been wondering whether it's logical to dig pennies. Here's the situation as I see it.

It's a lot of effort to dig up all those pennies. I'm sure you'll agree that the majority of the coins we find are pennies. We're not obligated to dig them up—most of our metal detectors show a number, emit a sound, or give another indication that you've likely located a penny. We can leave them alone if we wish. Metal detecting requires a lot of "ups and downs". Finding a penny is usually one of the downs.

Maybe it's because I'm a senior citizen, but I'm thinking pennies do not justify all the work of fre-

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quently bending down, getting on my knee, and digging for them. My back and knees hurt after a couple hours of hunting. Many of my Eureka pals have very bad backs and knees, possibly caused by digging too many pennies! I had a somewhat famous professor in law school, Renard Strickland, who joked that he thought God gave each of us a specific number of heartbeats in our lifetime, and he wasn't going to waste any of them on exercise! As you might guess, he was not in great shape. While I don't agree with his theory, I do know our knees and backs can't keep on metal detecting forever. Is it smart to beat up our bodies digging pennies? It takes a lot of time to dig up all those pennies, too. Let's say you are detecting on your lunch hour, or maybe it's Sunday morning and you only have a couple hours until church starts, or maybe it's Saturday afternoon and you only have a little while until your favorite college team (say Colorado State or Texas A&M) plays a game on TV. Do you really want to spend your limited time digging up pennies? Shouldn't you leave them behind and use your time hunting for better coins and treasures?

Here is a specific example of the "to dig or not to dig" dilemma. I usually don't find this many coins when I go detecting, but on a park hunt not long ago I found 7 quarters, 16 dimes, 4 nickels and 44 pennies, for a total of 71 coins. Of the pennies, only 29 were keepers; the other 15 were more recently minted, poorly made coins that were too deteriorated and corroded to be useable. The value of all the coins, then, was \$3.84. Other facts:

Percentage of total coins (71) that were pennies (44) = 62%

Percentage of pennies (44) that were not keepers (15) = 34%

Percentage of total value (\$3.84) attributable to pennies (\$0.29) = 8%

To summarize the facts above, I spent 62% of my time detecting and digging pennies, but the pennies were only worth 8% of the total value of the coins I found! Was this a good way to spend my time and effort? I think not, which is another reason why I am doubting the logic of digging up pennies. I spent the majority of my time chasing pennies, but those pennies contributed almost nothing to the value of all the coins located. I would have been smarter to ignore the pennies and focus instead on finding other coins and potential treasures. If you have read this article, I would like to offer you "a penny for your thoughts" about whether you think it's best to dig or not to dig a penny. I would like to hear your "two cents worth".

This raises one final question. When someone says to you "a penny for your thoughts", and then you put in your "two cents worth", what happens to the other penny? ~NR

In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (non-members may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times

during the hunt.

2. All hunters must wear headphones.
3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.

FIND-OF-THE-MONTH CATEGORIES

Gold: natural gold (flakes, nuggets, wire) stamped karat alloy content or obvious custom alloy item, except gold coins which are entered in the Coin Category.

Jewelry: objects of metal often set with gems and worn for personal adornment, except jewelry qualifying for the Gold Category.

Coin: a piece of metal issued by governmental authority as money.

Token: a piece resembling a coin issued by some person or entity, not of a governmental authority (with the exception of tax tokens), that could be redeemed for services or specified items. Advertisement tokens with no redeemable value are entered in the Artifact Category.

Artifact: simple object showing human workmanship or modification, and all other items that do not meet the criteria for other categories.




