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Coinhuna hunt report

First off I have give my apologies to all for not getting a hunt flying into the previous months newsletter. Roy Nevs and I were co-hosts of this hunt and we had a lack of communication as to who was doing what. We had another successful coinhuna competition hunt, crowning a new Eureka Treasure Hunters club competition hunt champion. The weather was wonderful with the sun shining, highs in the mideighties and a bit of a breeze. Wow, we could not have asked for any better weather! Then to make things even better we had a potluck and BBQ with Grillmaster John Hinton. John grilled up some wonderful burgers and dogs. Thanks for doing the cooking again John.

We had 25 hunters signed up to compete when we began the hunt. The hunt field was set up in concentric circles with the outer circle being a 50 foot radius and the inner circles being in 10 foot increments. The circles were split into quadrants that meant that there was going to be only 6 people in each quadrant to start with. We were expecting 36 people at the hunt so the hunt field was seeded pretty heavily in the first round.

The hunters drew poker chips to determine who was in which quadrant of the round one circle they would start in.



We set it up so that within each quadrant the 4 hunters that found 7 silver dimes first moved on to round two. And each round after the first the hunters to find 10 silver coins to move on in the competition. The coin count was verified by hunt officials Bill Chapman, John Steele, Sharon Harkins and myself. The official starter for each of the rounds was Louise Smyth. Having officials to check the hunters coins was important because in round two John Olson found the appointed amount of coins three different times. It was pointed out by official Chapman that John was including in his count clad dimes that were natural finds. The number of hunters was cut in half with each round and we ended up with Roy Nevs and Bernice Ortiz in the finals. This duo had faced off in pervious coinhuna championships. As a matter of fact Bernice has been a regular in the finals ever since we have been putting on this competition. In order to make sure that our Coinhuna could find more than silver dimes I decided to put 21 buffalo nickels and 19 silver dimes in the final hunt field and the Coinhuna was to find 20 of those coins. The first to 20 coins was Bernice, she had come in second several times and finally she won the championship. Way to go Bernice!! For winning our Coinhuna championship Bernice wins a \$1 gold piece, a coinhuna vest and her name on the championship plaque.

After we crowned our 2011 club champion the hunt fields were opened up to all who participated. But those who got knocked out in the first round and those who helped put on the hunt got a three minute head start. All in all I would say that this hunt was a success. I heard a couple of grumblings from those that were knocked out in the first round, but

they were happy to hear they got a head start on cleaning up the spoils.



A cryptogram is an encoded message. The code used is called a simple substitution cypher. This means that the message is encoded by replacing each character in the message with a letter of the alphabet. TREASURE HUNTER'S CODE OF ETHICS


- I WILL respect private property and do no treasure hunting without the owner's permission.

General Requirements of a Member

Members are required to abide by the Treasure Hunter's Code of Ethics and Bylaws of the club.

Members should attend as many meetings and outings as possible.

Members should be willing to serve on a committee if asked.

Members are encouraged to participate in events.

Members are encouraged to promote fellowship within the club, with other organizations of similar interests and with the community.

Members, if eligible, are encouraged to run for any elective office.

Members in violation of the Club's bylaws are subject to disciplinary action, as determined by the Executive Board.

Board of Directors

1. Board members, along with the other officers of the Club, shall comprise an Executive Board which shall aid in Club policy-making decisions.

- 2. The Board of Directors shall represent the Club when dealing with community agencies or other Clubs with mutual interest.
- The Board of Directors shall be an extension of the President and Vice-President.
- 4. The Board of Directors shall be called in on all special meetings called by the President.

Board Meeting

- 1. Any Executive Board member who misses three (3) Board meetings in succession may be removed from that position at the discretion of the Board
- 2. A special election may be held at the next general membership meeting to elect and fill any vacant position.



Bronze Seal from Atocha Found – Large Emeralds Found by Investor during Emerald City Week





Last week on the Atocha site proved, once again, that we are on the right trail. Captain Andy and the Magruder crew went out on Friday and were able to dive a couple of days before they moved to Emerald City. In those two days they found two EOs (encrusted objects), two silver coins and an extraordinary artifact – a bronze seal in exceptional condition.

The oval-shaped seal was found about 200 yards south of where we found the 9-carat emerald ring in July, 2011. This seal is a very important piece since it was found right along the same line as the gold rosary, the gold bar, and the beautiful emerald ring. There is a crest on it which may identify the owner and could possibly confirm that this is also the owner of the emerald ring. It is another clue towards uncovering one of the many mysteries of the Atocha.

Captain Andy described the seal to us over the radio: "It is about one inch wide and 2 inches tall, with an intricate design around the outside edges. There are two four-legged animals that look like llamas standing next to each other and a tropical tree, possibly a palm tree. Other parts of the design include 3 arrows pointing upwards and a thick line similar to the icon on the silver coins that represents Austria. This is a fabulous find, in great condition!" Matroci added.

Seals like this one were typically used to stamp their identifying mark into hot wax on a letter or official document.

In-Town Hunt Schedule

If this sounds familiar, the rules regarding in-town hunts bear repeating. Again, I want to reiterate in-town hunt rules for those who seem to have missed the obvious by failing to read and follow the instructions the club has provided. We want you to put on hunts. They are designed to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you MUST:

- Schedule with the Huntmaster.
- > Provide a plan.
- Provide flyers.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- The hunt master for any particular hunt can decide open hunt (non-members may hunt) or members only.
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

- 1. Pouches to store finds and trash MUST be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
- 2. All hunters must wear head-phones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open. A first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt, will usually get people's attention
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash on the hunt field should re ceive the same treatment dis cussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Huntmaster (Roy Neys) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.


