Upon the opening of the library at 1:00 PM we made our way up to the 5th floor for our

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research session. We entered into the gallery just outside the research facility and waited for our members to arrive. Here I talked a bit about what was available within this portion of the library and what our assignment was. I decided that our group should look for information on baseball. I know that this subject seems a bit odd for some, but in the late 1800's up through the early 1900's baseball was king. Every town, mining camp and neighborhood within the Denver-metro area had a baseball team. The games would draw hundreds of people to watch and in those days there were few bleachers for people to sit in so most had to sit on the ground. There were often vendors selling food, candy and sodas so money was exchanging hands.

As we entered the Western History and Ge-

nealogy space and people dispersed to different means of research. We had members looking on the computer at the historic photos, people were looking at the Sanborn maps, some were looking at the topographical maps, some were on microfilm and still others were hitting the card catalog. After a couple of hours we had some really good leads to some historic baseball parks. There were photos, news stories, maps and plenty of other information that will lead those that took the time to do some research to some good finds.

Treasure Puzzle

In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- > Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (nonmembers may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

- 1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
- 2. All hunters must wear headphones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.

Wheatridge requires a permit to metal detect in their city. No detecting is allowed October-March. Permits allow detecting April-September.



PPAL Member John Steele Finds Roman Burial Site In England By Andy Roake

For his 70th birthday, PPAL (Pikes Peak Adventure League) member John Steele received a 10-day detecting tour in Buckinghamshire, England, from his daughter. He went on the trip in October and took his White's V3i detector. Steele said, "There were 12 of us total detecting, 10 from the states and 2 from England. The routine for the eight days of detecting was: eat breakfast, detect all day, clean up, eat dinner, sleep and start over again. The perfect vacation."

On his first day, Steele said, "My first find was a copper coin like object about the size of a quarter. I later found out it is a token dated 1636. The back says 'his half penny.' I was psyched. It was by far the oldest token I had ever found, and I have found my share of tokens in Colorado. After more searching and finding lots of stuff I didn't know what they were (they tell you not to throw anything away until they look at it), it was time to head back to the truck. On my way back I found my first of three hammered silver coins. Turned out it was a James the 1st sixpence. Over the next eight days I found two more: an Edward 1st (longshanks) silver penny (think Brave heart) from the 13th century and an Elizabeth 1st 1594/5 schilling. I also found a George the 1st silver pence love token from the early 1700's."

During the trip he also found several dozen Roman coins of different sizes, a Saxon cord end, a piece of a bronze age ax and other artifacts that are still in England being identified and certified for export license.

On his second day of detecting he said he got a "weird reading" on his detector and, he said, "after digging down over a foot I see what at first I perceive to be the top of a stove pipe." After digging further he came upon some broken "fine looking" pottery and realized the pipe is a copper or bronze artifact. After discussing the site with the landowner, they agree to contact the local archaeologists who spent the rest of the week digging the site. The archaeology team determined

that Steele discovered a 2nd century cremation Roman burial; which the team said is unusual. Steele said, "It's called a box burial because all the remains plus the offerings were originally in a 3x2 foot box. The person's remains were in a leather bag (long gone) in a bowl. There were also three other ceramic bowls, a bronze dish/bowl, a glass vessel of some kind, an iron trivet, some iron nails, an iron latch and a flagon (pitcher shaped drinking vessel) made of bronze with a unique handle. The handle had a winged victory (Valkyrie) adorned with erotic figures. There are only a few of these known and none, as far as they said, ever in England. The pottery/ceramics are very high quality and were made in ancient Gaul."

Steele said, "The thing I found fascinating, spooky maybe, was that the potters imprinted their name on the bottom of all the ceramics. Think about that; 1,900 years ago someone made this stuff and we can tell who made it and the archaeologist can tell where the person came from and what shop he worked in. That is as close to immorality as one can hope for. All the items in the grave indicate that the person was what they call "high status," meaning he was someone im-

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portant enough to have very valuable items in his grave and to be cremated. It could be a man or a woman; we may never know. But he was definitely important, probably the landowner and a member of the upper class."

During the excavation, the British Museum sent a crew to the site to video the process and interview Steele.

Steele said, "The excavation was a success with the help of everyone and the remains were preserved and are in the process of being analyzed and hopefully restored. I am promised pictures of everything when it is cleaned, cataloged and restored."

He added, "While there I discussed with my wife, Charlotte, what we should do [with the site artifacts] we agreed that it should stay in country,

especially after being there 1,900 years. So I signed my interest over to the Bucks County Museum. Hopefully it will be displayed and studied for years to come. Maybe that will bring the immortality he or she was looking for."

"The Godfather" Metal Detector By Chris Davis

For the last 30 years I have been using two detectors, both Minelab. Both these machines were made back in the day when you used knobs to fine tune, not computer programs. My land machine is a Sovereign, with a Sun Ray S-1 pinpointer. (Yes, I admit I have searched for 20 minutes with the coil off, wondering all the while, why I never got any hits...). The unit works well, but is heavy. I purchased this machine about 1983, so it is almost broken in.

My water machine is an Excalibur. I originally purchased it with an 8" coil, but sent it back to the factory and had a 10" coil put on. This was not for increased depth, but to maximize the coverage per swing. In 2010 I ordered one of the 5 foot shafts, which distributed the weight better and made extended hunting much more comfortable.

I moved to Colorado in 2013. Several months later I joined my first metal detecting club, the Eureka! Treasure Hunters Club. I noted most of the folks up here tend to favor the various White's and Garrett models, but a few, including John Cornelisse and Win Faires, had the XP Deus. I was impressed.

So, I spent the next 3 or 4 months researching the Deus. I was first impressed to no end by the extremely light weight. The unit weighs in at only 2.2 lbs. The detector is also compact, and can easily fit in a suitcase or backpack. There is no wire snaking up the shaft. The headphones, coil and remote control are wireless. The machine allows for selection of 4 different frequencies. There are 10 default search programs and the ability to set 8 more custom programs. Allegedly, future updates can be downloaded from the factory site. All the reviews were excellent. Historically, I have primarily been a jewelry and coin hunter. Neither of the machines I had were really designed for relic or gold hunting. Like many machines today, the Deus can do it all. An additional water kit enables the unit to submerge to a depth of 10 feet, which takes care of my water hunting needs.

However, two serious problems immediately grabbed my attention. First, it is a French machine. Despite having a mother named Vauchelet, I am extremely wary of anything French. Of course, the other half of the family is English, so you can see why I am constantly at war with myself. It has been my limited experience, despite the Statue of Liberty thing, the French do not appear to be overly fond of Americans.

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On my one 24 hour layover in Paris, I noted a corridor of French policemen armed with machine guns around the U.S. Embassy, and they would not even let me take their pictures. On the other hand, since then, I have had two different individuals of French nationality assure me a visit to Paris can in no way be construed as a visit to France.

Second, the price. I did a detailed search of the internet, and found a uniform price of \$1899. That is kinda steep for us poor retired folks. Never-the-less, I continued my research efforts.

While I was pondering all this information, John C. mentioned a Deus dealer from New Orleans would be attending the next Club meeting. Mr. Richard Angelico, of Cayenne Metal Detectors, made a good presentation. I inquired as to the faults of the machine. He told me it does not work well in salt water. Seeing as how as we do not have an awful lot of salt water up in Colorado, I decided I could live with this shortcoming. Then came the big question. How much would he sell the machine for? "\$1550". This was a real low blow. I could hum-ho and procrastinate when the cost was \$1900, but he was making me get off the fence and face the wrath of my wife

I have named this new Deus machine, "The Godfather". The man made me an offer I could not refuse.

As previously mentioned, all my old machines are virtually antiques. This new detector has all kinds of computer screens, menu's and options I am not accustomed to. I am sure a 5 year old kid would have no problem, but being close to an antique myself, it has been quite a steep learning curve.

With my Sovereign, a "550" target ID means Silver, or a Dime, or a Quarter, or a Dollar Coin, sometimes a penny, copper items, sometimes aluminum. Whatever. It means "dig". Most bottle caps have a "buzz" and often an iron signal. Of course, if I want gold, I dig all solid, repeatable hits.

With the Deus when I get a quarter signal, it is a quarter. Unfortunately, silver rings, many bottle caps, and dimes all seem to produce similar signals. Which is why I have been digging an awful lot of bottle caps. With continued practice, I expect to get better at differentiating these items.

I figure, in 30 years or so, I should have this beast conquered.




