A cryptogram is an encoded message. The code used is called a simple substitution cypher. SHIFTING GEARS

Greetings from semi-beautiful Watkins, Colorado. Spring has sprung, flowers are blooming, the ground has thawed out and hopefully you have already dug some great treasures. The dirt even smells good in the spring, unless you are hunting where the goose poo has been fermenting all winter!

When you arrive at your hunt site, you need a plan on how to search the area. How much time you have to hunt and the mood you are in may determine your approach. Are you trying to hunt the whole area during your lunch hour or do you have all day? Are you trying to get all the good items in the area or do you want a sampling to see if it might be your next hot spot? Are you looking for someone's lost ring and it's getting dark, or are you trying to locate that small gold flake in iron trash? Is it a seeded club hunt or do you just want to have some time to yourself and forget your worries and swing your detector?

Answering these questions determines what 'gear' we shift to when hunting. Many detectorists shift into high gear at seeded hunts and the race is on at the starting bell. Their coil search pattern resembles a series of Zs and many targets are left for others to find. While searching for gold in Alaska, I got behind a guy in our group who was detecting down a path toward the vehicle. He was in high gear because we were to leave in 30 to 40 minutes. I shifted into low gear because I knew I had those extra few minutes. Bingo! Out popped a small corn flake nugget! Same place, same exact White's V3i, similar settings, but a lower gear let me cover the ground more thoroughly.

Adjusting the sweep speed on your detector can help you cover more square feet per hour but be careful not to go too far on your setting as the target may sound like trash or you may miss it entirely. Read your owner's manual to determine the best settings for the 'gear' you are in and targets you are looking for. Ask fellow Eureka! members for advice, if one of us doesn't know the answer, we will find someone who does.

Ok.....Ok, I have to admit that I am reminded by fellow hunters to slow down! I guess I'd better practice what I preach. I know I'm a better detectorist than I am a preacher!

FIND-OF-THE-MONTH CATEGORIES

Gold: natural gold (flakes, nuggets, wire) stamped karat alloy content or obvious custom alloy item.

Jewelry: objects of metal often set with gems and worn for personal adornment, except jewelry qualifying for the Gold Category.

Coin: a piece of metal issued by governmental authority as money (includes gold coins of any nation).

Token: a piece resembling a coin issued as money by some person or body not of a governmental authority; can be redeemed for services or specified items.

Artifact: simple object showing human workmanship or modification.

Three 10K Rings

Using her White's MXT at Argo Park, Cindy was searching for the Tenacious Treasure Tracker Token when she dug a VDI of 40 to find a heavy gold ring which was actually two rings with the second gold ring encircled by the first! She covered her 8 inch deep hole and rescanned and still got a signal, so reopened the hole and was super surprised to find yet another gold ring!

TAKE A CHANCE MONOPOLY HUNT

We had 32 hunters come out for the April "It's Your Chance Monopoly Hunt" on April 10. The cost was \$20 and all the hunt fees went into the ground in the form of coins. We gathered at Majestic View Park in Arvada at noon for burgers, dogs and side dishes brought by others. Thank you to those who contributed and to Ron Erickson who manned the grill.

Several of us met early to plant the field with hundreds of silver dimes, sprinkled with some silver quarters, halves, undated buffalo nickels, and 108 clad quarters and other miscellaneous coins. Jeff Lubbert also donated a couple of 40% silver halves, and an anonymous hunter donated a bunch of foreign coins that were thrown in the field.

The hunt field also contained 24 pennies with question marks on one side and a number on the other. Those pennies were good for a pick at a Chance Card. The Chance Cards had a chance similar to those in Monopoly, for instance, one said "You have been detecting for hours and you need something to quench your thirst. Advance to the Water Works and collect a Thermos." The prize was a one gallon Thermos. Another one said "The guest speaker at the club meeting got you interested in learning more about railroads. Advance to the "Reading" Railroad and collect a book on rail-



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roads.” A book on the building of the transcontinental railroad was given away for that chance card. Another said “Your hair is thinning on top and you’ve been detecting in the sun. Collect a Garrett hat to protect that tender scalp.” Other prizes included tickets to the railroad museum (donated by Richard and Linda Kibler), coupons for ice cream, a head lamp, pack of batteries, sunscreen, rain poncho, gold pan, zip lock bags, a loop, a silver quarter, trail mix, gloves, hand wipes, a probe, a pouch, a Garrett hat, electrical tape, display box, bug spray, and a survival whistle with compass (all donated by my hubby Ron). They were all items related to things we might need while metal detecting, and coming up with 24 different sayings to go with those prizes was both fun and challenging for me.



There were also seven monopoly game pieces in the field. Three of those pieces were good for a chance at winning a community chest (because there are three community chest spots on a Monopoly board). There were cards with a picture of each of the game pieces. Three of those cards were drawn and the individuals with the matching game piece got to pick a community chest. While all of them had a small cache of coins, Jay Reed (pictured left center) was the lucky winner of the community chest containing the gold coin.

Thanks to John Olson, Ron Erickson, Jeff Lubbert, and Chris Davis for helping plant the hunt field, and again this hunt, Boots Lewis, who donated a Spyderco knife. Also, thanks to Chris Davis and Cindy Bockenstedt for taking pictures and to anyone else I may have inadvertently omitted from the list of helpers.



In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (non-members may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression

of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
2. All hunters must wear headphones.
3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.

Westminster requires a permit to metal detect in their city. It will be good for a year.
