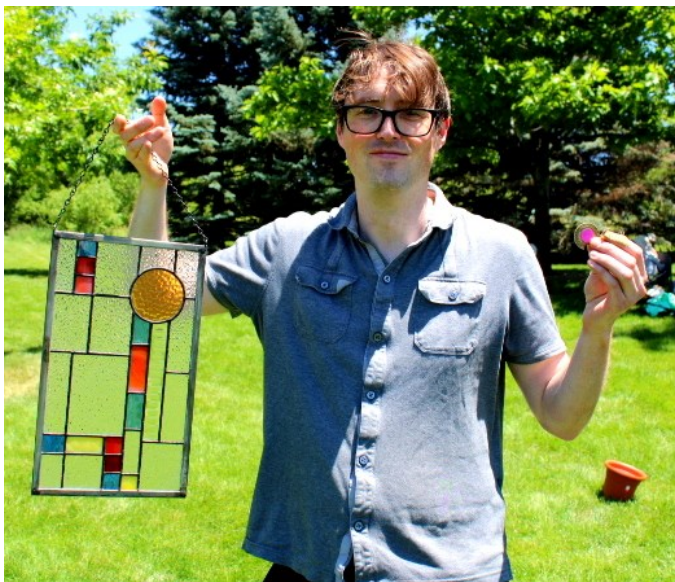
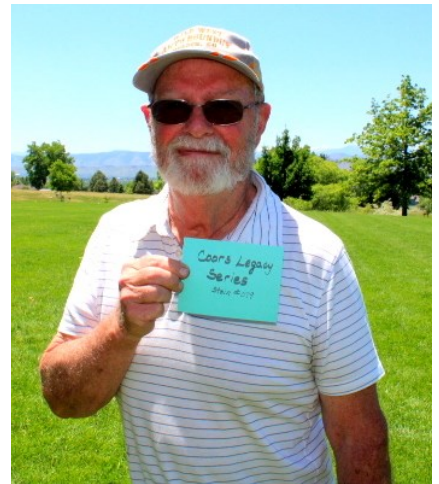

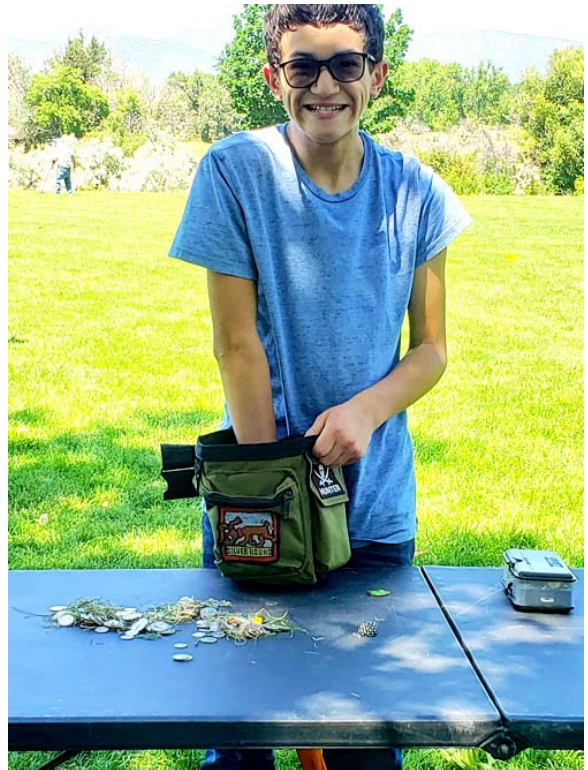

Gold Rings #87 and #88

This was my first run with the new XP Deus 2 V 1.1. I worked through the various programs over the 3 hours I actively searched. I was not overly impressed. My custom Nero Program did not work very well. For most of the programs, I am having to constantly raise the volume to hear the targets. The sounds are different. I could not get any emphasis on the signals. They all seemed rather bland. With V 0.7 good targets (and some trash) jumped out at you. The only program which worked well with the new version was my custom GM Power Program, on single frequency. The General Program worked fairly well.



This metal detecting run took place on Saturday, May 27, 2023. I had a pretty good day. Found \$10 in change, 2 necklaces and 6 rings. One ring I picked up was covered with what appears to be Chinese writing. At the last place I stopped, I dug up a ring with a huge stone. I pulled out my magnifying glass and was able to read,



“Tiffany & Co., 14K D2.00ct.”. My, that sounded encouraging. A 2 carat diamond from Tiffany & Co. might even pay for the day’s

gas. So, I decided to stop by the jewelry store on the way home. I walked into the store



and asked the fellow if he knew anything about jewelry. I said he knew a little bit, so I hit him 3 questions: 1) Does Tiffany make costume jewelry? He said no. 2) Is Tiffany jewelry counterfeited? Answer: Yes. 3) Is the stone in my ring a diamond? He looked at it with a glass, tested it and went into the back room (and I think he looked it up on the Tiffany website). Unfortunately, the verdict, it was a Cubic Zirconia (CZ),

not a diamond. My, what a letdown, which ruined my plan to finance my next several trips to England. Oh well.

It was a silly plan to start with, as if I really expected I would be able to get the ring away from my wife.

I went home and got on the internet. I discovered Tiffany does indeed produce jewelry



with CZs. After a bit more searching, I was able to identify the ring I found, for sale on eBay, for only \$950, used.



I suppose, if a ring costs \$950, used, it does not fall into the “costume jewelry” category.

The ring is 14K white gold. Still, you can understand my disappointment at it not having a 2 carat diamond.

I suppose using CZs is a shrewd marketing decision by Tiffany. There is nothing on the ring which destroys the illusion it is a diamond. The unsuspecting wife or fiancée will never know the difference unless she goes to a jeweler.

I went out again on Sunday. It was a slow day. Only found 4 rings. How disappointing. The one gold had a light green stone and was very pretty. I actually like it better than the Tiffany ring, but at only 10K, you can understand how I would be embarrassed to put it out on the Finds Table. Besides, the Tiffany ring has a much better story. I should point out, those little old ladies can be awful tough. It is much easier to trade 2 candy bars to the kids on the playground for their rings.

These two rings bring my total Career Gold Ring number to 88. Only 12 more, and I can quit metal detecting. That should not take more than 15 or 16 years.

Oh yes, detecting in the Denver area can be a real adventure. Of course, I cannot leave the house without Katie, unless I want to get bit. So, she goes on most of my metal detecting adventures with me. Unfortunately, with her black coat, she gets awfully warm, so once it gets hot, I tie her to a tree in the shade while I conduct my search. On this occasion, I was detecting on a school tot lot. The side gate was locked, so I tied her to the gate in the shade inside the enclosure. Halfway thru the hunt I looked up to see 2 homeless individuals trying to steal her. They had her squeezed thru the gate, but she was still tied
