Yeah, I know, you thought you were shed of me. But thanks to modern technology, a journey of 1,061 miles is but a mouse click away. You can thank (?) David and Marty for giving me a shot at being of service one more time. By the way, this photo is what AI thinks an oil painting of me would look like. Trust me, I don't really look this good.

I'm now *also* a member of the **Northwest Treasure Hunters Club - Spokane** (33 miles west of me; I can get to a meeting in another state quicker than Chris Davis can get to Denver.) They're nice folks, even if some of them do have Canadian accents. [Not true; geographical humor]



So, let's talk about my least favorite month. It's August. It's hot... maybe not Africa hot but hot enough to cause real problems for some of us. Older folks and those with compromised health are at higher risk while more robust persons might be just uncomfortable. Compounding this issue may be the lure of finding treasure. "We're only going to be out here a couple of hours", or "I'll just search one more field and drink after that", or "I don't want to carry water; it's heavy"; we've all had such thoughts.

During hot weather, people might become ill and it's critical to act fast. Heat illness can be prevented. Besides <u>keeping ones self hydrated</u>, it's important to learn the warning signs and how to help so you can react quickly.

Heat cramps are an early sign of trouble and include heavy sweating with muscle pains or spasms. To help, move the person to a cooler place and encourage them to drink water. Get medical help if symptoms last longer than an hour or if the person has heart problems.

Heat exhaustion is a more severe condition signaled by cool, pale and clammy skin; a fast or weak pulse; nausea or vomiting; tiredness or weakness; or a headache, dizziness or passing out. To help, move the person to a cooler place, loosen tight clothing, encourage them to sip water slowly. Use wet cloths, misting or fanning to help cool them off. Get medical help right away if symptoms get worse or last longer than an hour, or if the person begins vomiting or acting confused.

Heat stroke is a deadly condition that requires immediate medical help. Symptoms include a high body temperature; hot, red, dry or damp skin; a fast or strong pulse; a headache or dizziness; or nausea, confusion and passing out. Call 911 right away if you think someone may have heat stroke. Then move the person to a cool place, and use wet cloths, misting or fanning to help cool them off. Do not give the person anything to drink.

Stay safe out there. Happy hunting. WBM

Eureka Goes HOLLYWOOD with *Expedition Unknown*By Ken King





There is a massively popular television series called Expedition Unknown which airs on the Discovery Channel, Wednesday nights at 9pm Eastern. The show has been on the air since 2015 and is currently in its 15th season. For those that aren't familiar, Expedition Unknown follows the adventures of its Host, Josh Gates, as he travels the globe, exploring and investigating iconic mysteries, legends, buried treasures, archaeological discoveries, and unsolved events.



The Setup:

Last fall, Jeff Lubbert received a call from the producer of Expedition Unknown. They were looking for some help from metal detectorists in the area on an upcoming episode being filmed in Estes Park, Colorado. Tony and myself were invited to team up with Jeff and after a Zoom meeting with the show's producer, the plans were set. We all had to sign a non-disclosure agreement stating we wouldn't talk about the show until it was publicly aired. Well, now we can. Our episode, titled "The Lost Grave of Buffalo Bill", which is episode 3 of season 15, aired July 2nd, 2025. This episode centers on the controversary regarding where Buffalo Bill Cody's body was laid to rest. Everyone knows his grave is on Lookout Mountain in Colorado, but many believe his remains lie on the side of a mountain overlooking Cody, Wyoming. So, were we called in to help locate the buried body of Buffalo Bill Cody??? Well, no, we weren't, we were called in to locate something else, something buried, something associated with Buffalo Bill that if found, would be worth a fortune. Also, something near and dear to our hearts... WHISKEY!





The Backstory:

Back in 1873, the 4th Earl of Dunraven (Ireland), Windham Thomas Wyndham Quinn purchased a large amount of what is now Estes Park, CO to be used as a hunting preserve and would later build the areas first hotel/resort. An avid hunter and sportsman, and a man of considerable wealth, the Earl would put together large hunting expeditions and hire all the best local hunting guides, of which, Buffalo Bill Cody was one. These were large parties, and it took quite an effort to load provisions from his hotel up to his hunting lodge in the mountains above Estes Park. The legend says that crates of whiskey, brought over by the Earl of Dunraven from Ireland for his friends Buffalo Bill and Texas Pete, was buried up at the hunting lodge so that it could be retrieved later after the winter had passed without the need to carry the fragile bottles of liquid gold, up and down the mountainside. It was inevitable that the locations of these whiskey staches were forgotten and thus began the legend of the lost cache of Buffalo Bills whiskey. This is what we were there to help find, the lost cases of Lord Dunraven's Whiskey.







The Day of Filming:

The show put us up in hotels in Estes Park the night before the shoot. The next morning, after breakfast and meeting some of the crew, the three of us headed out to the location where we would spend the day filming. This was a very historic property we were on, a historical landmark. The landowners greeted us, talked about the history of the property, and showed us the lay of the land. They were amazing people and very happy we were there. Little by little the crew and other local archaeologists started showing up. Jeff, Tony and I already had our detectors out, we were geared up and ready to go. Pretty soon, Josh Gates, the host of the show comes driving up the driveway, all by himself, in a red pickup truck waving hello to everyone out the window. The sound guy was soon hooking us up to wireless microphones and the production team gathered to talk about the day, how things would go, where we would start, etc. At this point, Josh took over. Not only was he the host but he was in complete control of production. He directed everything regarding cameras, what to shoot, what angles to get, how many cameras, how many takes of each scene. It was pretty amazing to watch him work... and he swings a detector...







After some initial introduction shots, we were turned loose to go do what we do best, go find stuff. To us, it was just another day of metal detecting with your buddies, except there was a camera crew following you around. Josh was detecting with us also, having brought out his Equinox 800. We started finding items right away but would only call over the camera crew if it was something interesting that might tie to the story or the timeframe of the story, which was the 1870s forward. The camera crew was mainly following Josh around but as we would find things both Josh and the crew would coming running over and shoot a segment with us. Josh would kneel down, ask what we got, he would direct the cameras to setup a certain way and he would have a conversation with us about what we just found. Every now and then during the conversation he would say "oh, wait, that was good what you just said, say that again", then he would respond making sure it was all caught within the camera frame. This was about the most direction we would get. All our finds were organic and wild finds and all our conversations were unscripted except for the beginning intro scenes. Never did they once ask us to plant something, or make up something for the show, like I mentioned above, we were just out detecting like we do, having a good time finding things. It was awesome.





During the day, we all found many items but didn't know what would make the final cut after the show was edited. Just before lunch and the producers passed around a sandwhich menu from an awesome local custom sandwich shop and we could order what we wanted. At our lunch break, Josh, the crew, the archaelogists, the landowners and us three just sat around chatting with each other. There was absolutely no "hollywood' pretensousness in Josh or any of the crew. It was just as if you were sitting around taking a break with your buddies.

Tony, Jeff and I received a special treat when the landowners invited us into the house to take a tour and see how they had renovated the lodge. It was amazing to see and hear them describe how they used every piece of original material they could. They even re-used the square nails. They were so proud to be showing us but also excited that we were getting as excited as they were in seeing it and all the relics they had preserved and showcased in places of honor. These were our kind of people. People who reveled in the history that surrounded them and felt a duty to preserve that history.







After lunch, Jeff found an old 40cal whole bullet cartridge that could have been from the time of these Buffalo Bill hunting expeditions. Josh and the crew really were inpressed by that. Later Tony found an incredible brooch from that period that had cut stones and gold gilt on it. This also could have been from the times when Lord Dunraven and Buffalo Bill were visiting the lodge. Could it have fallen off the decorative vests each of these men would wear? We may never know.











On of the things that really impressed me is when we would find something, before Josh would go on camera to talk about it, he and everyone would pull out their cameras to research the item to make sure what he would say on camera was accurate. He could have just made stuff up for the show, but he had integrity to get it right.

Needless to say, we did not find the buried whiskey that day but we did find some whiskey. At the end of the day, Josh pulled out a bottle of Lagavulin 16 year single malt scotch whiskey and poured us all a shot for a toast and one final take to end the day of filming. If my memory is right, I think we had to re-do that final toast a few times just to make sure we got it right. None of us were complaning. After the cameras were off, Josh poured shots for the crew and we all did a toast together. An end to an amazing day with some awesome people.





Finally We Can Talk About It:

We were under a non-disclosure agreement until the show had an air date. Leading up to that, it was hard to keep the secret. Jeff and I had missed a Eureka meeting to be able to do this and we werent able to say anything as to why. Tony and I wanted to talk about it on our podcast but couldt say a thing. It was such a relief to get that air date and know we could start talking about it and talk about it we did. We promoted it everywhere we could. Jeffs podcast, our podcast, othe peoples podcasts and live streams and we flooded our social media pages with pictures and promotion. We did all this promotion but we were also very aprehensive because we had no idea how the edit would turn out. Would we all get included in the show, would we all end up on the cutting room floor, would only one make it on the show and not the other two? We had no idea. Also to make things worse, they started promoting the show as "the lost grave of buffalo bill". WHAT!!!??? They didn't mention anything about that to us when we were filming, they brought us out to

find the buried whiskey. We thought the entire episode was going to be about that Buffalo Bill legend. Never once did they say "oh, and by the way, this is all going to be tied into the controversary surrounding his final burieal place". Now we had to worry that they might portray us as grave robbers. Great, just what we need, showing detectorists as grave robbers. Jeff had planned a watch party and we all got together to watch the episode together. How would they integrate our whiskey search into the Buffalo Bill grave theme? We were a little nervous.

Thankfully, they did not make us out as grave robbers. They did a very good job tying things together but keeping our segment separate. We all made it on camera and they did a good job capturing our day of searching. Of course its hollywood so they have to make it exciting and entertaining but in regards to our three metal detecting segments, they did a good job keeping it highlighted the way it happened.

Final Thoughts:

We didn't know what to expect out of this experience. Tony and I have been on a TV show before and so has Jeff and we all had different experiences, some not so good, so we really didn't know if this would be more of the same or not. We were all pleased in that this was nothing like what we had experienced before. First off, Josh Gates, the host, is 100% who he is on camera. He is very personable, approachable, and not pretencious at all. He makes you feel very comfortable and its like hes been your buddy for years. We felt like we could say anything we wanted and he would joke with us, and poke fun with us, just like we do with each other when were out in the field. The crew were amazing. They were friendly and always willing to come over to capture something on film or even just answer questions about their gear, setup, etc... Tony and I being YouTube guys were really interested in that and they were more than willing to share words of wisdom with us. The landowners were just what you would hope to find in a landowner, they were passionate about the history of their property and excited to share it with us. They were so happy to have us there and we enjoyed talking with them tremendously. This whole experience was wonderful. Would we do it again? 100% we would, in a heartbeat. It was one of those life experiences you will hold onto and it was made even more special because we experienced it together as friends. You can catch our episode on the Discovery Channel, Discovery +, PhiloTV, MAX, and Hulu for on demand streaming. Our segment is the last 15 minutes of the show. They did give a special thanks to the Eureka! Treasure Hunters Club in the credits. We had a blast and who knows, they may be back to film another episode in Colorado sometime in the future. Maybe we can show our segment sometime at an upcoming club meeting.


[The following is excerpted from a recent email sent to Mr. Frese from Eureka members]


The tree expert might notice that there are three streets that would intersect the park. They are Ash, Birch and Cherry

Clue #7




This plaque at the park described the Highline Canal. This would eliminate City Park as an option and leave Mamie Dowd Eisenhower Park as the location.

Eureka! Breakfast Club Report – 19 July 2025

The Eureka! Breakfast Club held its second hunt of the month on 19 July 2025. The temperatures were a hair on the warm side, with highs in the low 90's. This did not stop the hardy (weak-minded) members of the Breakfast Club. We had some 23 participants foolish enough to show up.

The group went over to Verbena Park for the hunt. Last time we went there, several years ago, there was a druggie walking around hollering at the top of his lungs, trailed by 2 police officers. Unfortunately, we had no such entertainment on this day.

We had a very good hunt. Six rings were recovered. The best was found by Dillon, who picked up a very nice silver ring with tiny diamonds. This was the first ring he has found metal detecting. Not a bad start. Tom F. also got a nice silver ring with a pink stone. Terry H. got a tungsten carbide. I got a stainless steel. Diane M. dug up her first ring metal detecting! Roy N. stumbled over a ring also. Six rings on one hunt isn't too awful bad.





Marcus L. recovered a bracelet. It looks silver, but we will test it at the next meeting. Probably the best find of the day was a splendid nose ring picked up by Roy. He says he will wear it to the next meeting.



We did very well on coins. Of the 14 hunters reporting, as a group we recovered \$57.39. This comes to

an average of \$4.10 per hunter. That ain't too shabby. However, I noticed 95% of the coins I recovered were heavily tarnished. This tells me, despite the excellent number of coins found on this occasion, the park has a relatively slow replenishment rate, so it may be at least a year before it will be suitable for another hunt.

As usual, Jeff M. did best on coins with \$9.03. Brice had \$5.90, Roy had \$5.40 and Tom F. had \$5.18.

I should point out Brice Y. found a coin spill. He sat in one spot, in the sun, for over 2 hours digging "penny after penny" (actually "cent after cent"). Before he let a little sun run him off, he had recovered 230 "pennies". This is a pretty good haul, but I think Mary S. once dug 300 and still holds 1st place. If only Brice had persevered a little longer, he might have taken the lead. No guts, no glory.

Judging by the bottle caps I dug up, it appears Corona (11) is the beverage preferred by patrons of Verbena Park, followed by Heineken (5).





I WILL leave gates as found.


I WILL remove and properly dispose of any trash that I find.



Meeting Presentation by Phil Goodstein



His latest book is Park Hill Promise: Quest for an Idyllic Denver


