It was at the end of the hunt and I had found a prize token a few minutes ago, so I pouched the baggie and continued to hunt, hoping for another coin or token. Probably five more minutes went

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
AND INTRODUCING...

Big Coil vs Small Coil! And the Winner Is... by Chris Davis

Shortly after one of the big snowfalls we had last month began to melt, I got an invite to accompany Randy and Mary on a City Park hunt. I had put the big 13" coil on my XP Deus in an effort to start strengthening my arm and shoulder (back and brain) for an upcoming trip to England. I arrived at the park to find both Randy and Mary had equipped their junky Minelab Equinox's with what looked like 4" coils. Randy says they are 6" coils, but I think his tape measure shrunk. Of course, I made fun of their "Baby Coils" and expressed the hope that one day they would grow up into real coils.

A coil of one size may be better in a certain area and conditions than another. The big coil covers more square feet per swing. So, if at the end of the day, I swing over 1,000 square feet with my big coil, and you swing over only 300 square feet with your small coin, you would think, statistically, I would have the best chance of finding something good. The big coil works very well on fairly clean sites where you are digging everything. On the other hand, on very trashy sites you can get in amongst the garbage better with a smaller coil.





One of the advantages of City Park is it gets a tremendous amount of use. And of course, the more folks using a site, the more stuff they will lose. The disadvantage of City Park is that the tremendous number of people using it also tend to lose a tremendous amount of garbage. One swing of my big coil could easily get 20 hits. But, that is what the good Lord created the XP Deus (and also on the Minelab) Reactivity settings for. With a high Reactivity setting, on 3 coins and a pull tab laid one inch apart, you will get 4 separate beeps. With a low Reactivity setting, you will get one beep when passing over the 4 targets. It is easy to see how a higher Reactivity can help separate good targets from trash. Lastly, whether using a small

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or a large coil, the tendency is to start skipping pull tabs and aluminum foil targets after you dig those first 100 or so garbage targets.

Randy and Mary, with their small coils, could get in amongst the trash and taller vegetation far better than I. On this particular hunt, there was an awful lot of garbage. The fun kinda wears thin after you dig that 50th or so pull tab. As a result, I quickly reverted to digging only nickel and penny or above signals. While such a strategy is very good for coins and silver rings, it virtually eliminates the chances of finding 90% of the gold rings. At the end of the day, I was left to wonder how many gold rings I had skipped over. I will never know. I dug at least 20 nickel sounding targets, but got only 1 actual nickel. However, the technique still produced a fine collection of pull tabs.



At the end of the hunt, I came out on top in change with \$4.01. Mary only had \$3.85 and Randy recovered a pitiful \$2.70. However, both Randy and Mary did a tad better than I in the ring category. They each found 2 rings, while I found only one. But, my one was very nice. It wasn't, but it should have been engraved, "P.O.S." (this stands for "Piece of s...stuff"), which is very closely related to the much sought after "Leaveright" (Leave 'er right where you found it). During this hunt, it took Randy all of 30



minutes to find a gold ring. A nice man's wedding band, yellow gold, 10K with a VDI at the lower end of the penny range. Which is why some of us always dig penny signals. Mary had to settle for a silver ring, which I would not have even picked up (unless I had a chance).

Oh yes, two days before, I had started having trouble with my "good knee". Not the one I had replaced at Walmart. I decided to go detecting anyway. I just had to decide which knee to go down on, my "bad knee" which I had had replaced 4 or 5 years ago, or my newly bad "good knee". After a bit of experimentation, I discovered I was putting on less stress by going

down on my bad "good knee". My knee worked out very well. I was able to get up and down without much problem all day. I made the hour drive home, but when I got out of the truck, I found I could barely walk. Talk about adding injury upon insult. It is indeed tough to get old.

So, with all this wonderful information, you will have to judge for yourself which is the best machine... a fine, sturdy XP Deus with a huge, back-breaking 13" coil, or one of those junky Minelab Equinoxes with a baby "4 inch" coil.




